ANNUAL REPORT

It was with deep regret that the Board heard of the sudden death of its Chairman on the 5th June, 1964. General Sir Douglas Gracey, K.C.B., K.C.I.E., C.B.E., M.C., had been elected Chairman in January, 1960, in succession to Mr. Norman Morris. During his four years as Chairman, General Gracey had endeared himself to us all, colleagues, staff and patients alike, through all the qualities which he possessed and offered without stint, to further the work of this Hospital and Home. It never took him long to find the right answer to the many problems put to him, and his firm but tactful guidance in the Hospital's affairs, inspired by an enthusiasm which increased each year, made him the respected and popular leader of the Board of Management.

General Gracey's concern in the well-being of the staff was one of his chief interests. "Without a good staff the patients will not be well cared for, so we must do everything to recruit and keep really good men and women", was his reasoning when proposing the building of modern accommodation for married and single staff. It is therefore entirely appropriate that the Board has decided that one of the blocks of flats now being constructed, should be called after General Gracey. The Board has also decided that the second block of flats should be named after Mr. Norman Morris, his predecessor from 1948-1960, whose obituary was published in the previous Annual Report.

The Board is glad to announce that General Sir Horatius Murray, G.C.B., K.B.E., D.S.O., has been elected Chairman. After a long and distinguished army career, General Murray has come to live in London, and the Board is indeed fortunate to find one of his ability with the necessary time to devote to the affairs of the Hospital and Home, and with its interests so much at heart. The Board hopes that General Murray will find as much satisfaction in the work as all his predecessors have done.

PATIENTS

We were able to admit 68 patients during the year. This abnormally high number was possible as more beds became available for re-occupation as the re-wiring of the electrical installation was completed. Many old friends have passed on during the year, including six, each one of whom was in our care for over thirty years. On the other hand, there were ten who lived for less than one year: this is not an abnormal number in spite of the steps taken to admit only those whose prognosis is likely to be at least two years.

For the sixth year running we have admitted more cases of multiple sclerosis (25) than any other disability. The sufferers from this terrible disease are all the more unfortunate in that most voluntary Homes seem to limit the number of these cases which they can admit

—probably because they need so much more nursing care and attention. The Board has set no limit in that respect, though the problem of recruiting nurses may force the issue before long. Sufferers from rheumatoid arthritis form the next largest group (20), and there is no doubt that these two diseases account for the largest number of people who suffer from diseases for which there is at present no known cure. One can only hope that the research which is being conducted throughout the country will soon find a cure for both.

The Board considers it important only to admit those who are young enough in mind to benefit from the many amenities and facilities for treatment which are available. For that reason the normal upper age limit for admission is 70, but the House Committee is always willing to consider exceptional cases where the applicant is particularly young for his or her age, and in fact there have been two patients admitted recently who are well over that age, but who have settled down happily. The average age of the 48 women admitted during the year was 60: that of the 20 men admitted was 51.

There are 48 patients who pay the set fee of 11 guineas a week. This in fact is now only two-thirds of the actual cost. This scale was fixed in 1959, but although costs have been rising steadily the Board has refrained from raising the fees, as this could only cause hardship to those who live—as most of our patients do—on fixed incomes.

A further 83 patients are sponsored by Local Authorities, and again no application has been made for two years to the Authorities concerned to raise the maintenance rates. All these patients, and a hundred or so others who have no sponsor, are required to contribute according to their circumstances, but there are some who are unable to contribute anything. The Board is careful to ensure that all patients are left with sufficient money for their personal needs. The average of all these contributions from patients and their sponsors is about £7 per week, leaving £10 10s. 0d. to be found from voluntary sources, supplemented by the income from the endowments of past benefactors.

PENSIONERS

There are now only 95 pensioners, or “extra patients”, as they were once called. It is still the Board’s policy not to elect any new pensioners, as it is felt that the facilities now available through the Welfare Departments of Local Authorities, and other statutory bodies, are so much improved that the need for our pensions is correspondingly reduced. A scheme is therefore being prepared for submission to the Charity Commissioners, for permission to apply the revenue of the Pensions Fund to the Hospital and Home, which is clearly the major commitment of the Board. Until this scheme is approved, the revenue of the Pension Fund is being applied for the greater benefit of existing pensioners and to help temporarily those on the waiting list for admission.

PATIENTS' ACTIVITIES

The principle that patients should be able to lead as normal a life as possible continues to provide the main theme. The library, the shop, the ladies' hairdressing salon and the barber's shop, the newspaper service and the weekly cinema, are all examples of what is available within the building as part of the Home life.

There is also much activity in therapy. The Physiotherapy Department gives regular treatment to 140 patients, but shortage of staff is the limiting factor in this department. The Occupational Therapy Department runs a variety of classes. In the mornings 29 patients do light industrial work, mainly in simple assemblies and packaging on behalf of industrial firms, for which the patients receive pay at piece rates. In the afternoon a variety of crafts are taught and practised. Mrs. Pawluk takes a pottery class once a week, and the benefits of the new kiln, given last year by the members of the Chatham Circle of the National Association of Ladies' Circles, is proving its value.

Art classes have recently been started. About eight patients attend once a week under the direction of Mr. Young.

Music therapy continues to be one of the most popular weekly events, and Mr. and Mrs. Gibbs have been glad to welcome a number of new arrivals. The choir has given three successful performances during the year: German's "Merry England" was given last November, a Nativity Play, with the aid of the Holy Trinity Youth Organisation, at Christmas, and Offenbach's "Tales of Hoffman" in September. At all these performances distinguished singers take the solo parts. The Board is most grateful to these soloists, and in particular to Norman Tattersall, who is a regular performer, and to Roy Teed, who always shares with Hebe Gibbs the accompaniment on two pianos.

The Magic Circle gave their usual polished performance on the 23rd November, 1963, in memory of their Founder, David Devant, and there have been many other enjoyable performances on the new stage on Saturday afternoons. All the artistes at these entertainments give their services free.

There have been many outings, organised by Matron: the number of outings is limited to the occasions when a suitable ambulance coach is available. Another type of outing, which the Rotary Clubs of Putney and Wandsworth organise annually, is a fleet of

private cars which take two or three patients each; on the 23rd July, 1964, fifty-two patients enjoyed an outing organised by them.

The students of our neighbours, Whitelands Teachers' Training College, also deserve the gratitude of the Board for the many ways in which they help. Taking thirty patients to the College matinee and giving them tea afterwards; looking after patients at our Garden Party; selling Alexandra Day roses from dawn to dusk; visiting individual patients and reading to them or writing their letters: these are only examples of what many of them do.

The General Election gave an opportunity for the patients to exercise their rights as citizens. Political meetings in the Home were held by all three candidates, and as the main hall was, as usual, a polling station, most patients were able to vote in person.

The Garden Party was held on the 20th June. The weather was only just good enough to keep to the outdoor programme, but over a thousand guests were present. Mr. Frankie Howerd was a popular principal guest, as the photographs show, and the Board was also glad to welcome the Mayor of Wandsworth, Alderman Mrs. A. E. Bush, J.P. The stall-holders had all worked hard to produce a variety of attractive articles for sale, and the Metropolitan Police dogs gave an entertaining and instructive display. The Board is grateful to all

The Annual Sale of Patients' Work was held this year on Saturday, 17th October, and was opened by Lady Hoare. This was the second year when the Sale was confined to one day, but attendance was good and over £1,000 was taken. As usual, the proceeds of this Sale are returned to the patients for their personal use. The Board is most grateful to Miss Dean, the Chairman of the Sale of Work Committee, and the ladies of the Authorised Visitors who organise it, as well as to Lady Hoare for her personal interest.

STAFF

Everyone was delighted and proud to see our Matron's name on the Birthday Honours List. The Queen has recognised Miss Howard's long and devoted service to nursing, and particularly as our Matron for ten years, by appointing her a Member of the British Empire. The Board heartily congratulates Miss Howard on this well deserved honour.

The death in June, 1964, of Miss K. M. Corbett, S.R.N., who was Miss Howard's predecessor for 13 years, was sad news. Her quiet efficiency and natural charm made her a universal favourite, and although she left ten years ago there are still many patients who remember her with affection.

Mr. Arthur Morris, our Head Porter, celebrated 50 years' service on the staff in March, 1964, and the occasion was marked by the presentation of a gold wrist watch by General Sir Douglas Gracey.

Miss Garner, Superintendent Physiotherapist, retired in June after nine years of devoted service. Although handicapped by staff shortages in her department, she never allowed this to curtail the treatment to the patients by working herself to the point of exhaustion. The Board welcomes in her place Mr. V. Parkinson, who came from a similar

position at the Queen Elizabeth College for the Disabled in Leatherhead. The Board was also sorry to lose the services of Miss E. Bright, who had been Head Occupational Therapist since 1960 and who left to work at the Royal County Hospital in Guildford. The Board welcomes Miss M. McCrossan in her place.

On the administration side, the Accounts Department has been strengthened by the part-time engagement of Mr. J. Tudor, whose previous experience as a Bank Manager is of great value.

Staffing the Hospital and Home, particularly on the nursing side, continues to present many problems. The trained staff of Ward Sisters and Staff Nurses plays such an important and personal part in the lives of the patients that continuity is of paramount importance. This continuity has unfortunately been difficult to achieve during the year owing to the number of changes caused by resignations. Two vacancies have been filled by Sister Lenham and Sister Hodgman, who are warmly welcomed. Additional trained staff have recently been authorised, which will spread the load of responsibility more evenly.

An innovation this year has been the appointment of two part-time receptionists in the main hall. Mrs. Whitfield in the mornings and Miss Kings in the afternoons, not only direct visitors but answer patients' enquiries on a variety of matters.

CHAPLAINCY SERVICES

Following the preferment of Bishop Howell, the Rev. I. K. Savile, the new Vicar of Wandsworth, has taken up his duties as Chaplain to the Hospital. The Board hopes that this arrangement can be permanent, as the whole parish staff participates in the chaplaincy duties and this provides the variety which is popular with the patients. The Board takes this opportunity of acknowledging with sincere gratitude the generous anonymous gift of capital, the income from which enables the Board to give proper remuneration for this chaplaincy service.

An innovation which Mr. Savile has now introduced is the formation of a Church Council of Patients, which will be able to perform, in a limited way, the duties of a Parochial Church Council. Membership of the Patients' Council will not be limited to members of the Church of England, and it is hoped that all denominations will co-operate to make this a truly ecumenical council.

The Board takes this opportunity of thanking the visiting chaplains of the Baptist, Congregational and Methodist Churches for all they do for the patients, not only in each taking two services a month, but also for the visiting and other activities which they organise.

The Board is also glad that the Roman Catholic priest and his staff, who have always been assiduous in their duties towards the Roman Catholic patients, have accepted the offer of a room where Mass can be celebrated regularly.

THE BOARD OF MANAGEMENT

The resignation of Mr. Charles Villiers, owing to increasing business commitments, will be a loss to the Finance Committee on which he has served so conscientiously since 1950. In his place the Board welcomes Mr. Gordon Popham, who is an Investment Manager in J. Henry Schroder Wagg & Co. Ltd., the firm which has managed the Board's investments so successfully for the last thirteen years.

COUNTY COMMITTEES

The London and Surrey Committees are still the only ones which have been formed. Without them it would not be possible to hold any functions, and the Board is most grateful to their Chairmen, Lady Norton and Mrs. Habershon, and to all their hard-working members. Between them they raised over £4,000 during the year—a figure that speaks for itself.

The Surrey Committee Ball was again held in the Hospital and Home and enjoyed by over 700 guests. The financial success of the Garden Party was largely due to the stalls organised by the London and Surrey Committees. Although held just after the end of the year to which this report relates, the Bridge Drive held at the Mansion House and organised by the London Committee, must be mentioned. The Board is most grateful to the Lord Mayor for so kindly allowing the Mansion House to be used for this event, and to Lady Harman for her presence.

LAND

As forecast in the last Annual Report, the Wandsworth Borough Council has now bought 10½ acres of the Hospital land, for building development. To correct any misapprehension that the patients will no longer be able to enjoy the gardens or that their privacy will be threatened by the new building, the Board wishes to stress that not only are the gardens, which the patients use, remaining intact, but that there will be a strip of land some 50 yards wide beyond the garden, still owned by the hospital. Furthermore, the Wandsworth Borough Council has complied strictly with the "Gentlemen's Agreement" that it would plan the development in such a way that the Hospital and Home would not be overlooked by multi-storey flats. The Board has seen the Council's plan and has continued—and will continue—to keep a careful watch on all aspects of the development. The disposal of the land will not deprive the patients in any way of the priceless amenities of privacy and spacious gardens which have been colourfully maintained and are at present being expansively improved.

Economically this sale of land is undoubtedly of advantage. The orchards were more of a liability than an asset; the money received from the sale of excess fruit, which in any case was very difficult to market, did not pay for the costly labour required to harvest it, prune the trees and spray them.

As compensation for this compulsory purchase the Board has received £325,000. A new cottage for the Head Gardener and new garden outbuildings have already been completed at a cost of nearly £10,000. Work has already started on building new staff accommodation, consisting of eight flats for married staff, five flats for single staff, and a flat for the use of relatives of patients who come from a long distance, at the cost of a further £78,000.

The balance has been invested and forms the capital of a new Development Fund. A small committee has been set up under the chairmanship of General Murray, to advise the Board on the best use of this fund. Suggestions for modernising and improving the facilities for treatment as well as the amenities for patients, have been invited from patients and staff, and expert advice will be sought on a variety of possible projects. The income from this capital sum is being ploughed back into the Fund until concrete plans have been agreed. This capital sum will be of the greatest help in streamlining and modernising the hospital; although much has been done in recent years, the Board is determined that the patients and staff shall benefit from the many modern techniques and new ideas which are now available.

FINANCE

The accounts are shown on pages 18 to 21. It will be seen that there was an overall deficit of just over £2,500, or 1%. Income, excluding legacies, was increased by some £5,000, but legacies at £54,846 were £48,000 less than for the previous year. Expenditure increased by nearly £6,000, all of which is accounted for by increased salaries and wages as laid down by national agreements.

The balance sheet shows a satisfactory position. The book value of investments has increased by £36,000, and the capital value of the Funds has risen by some £51,000, excluding the Development Fund. For this satisfactory state of affairs the Board is indebted to J. H. Schroder Wagg & Co. Ltd., who act as investment managers to the Finance Committee.

It is disappointing to note that income from voluntary sources has decreased this year by £6,000. The Board asks all those who have the interests of the Hospital and Home at heart to give as generously as possible so that it will not be necessary to realise capital to meet current expenditure—a course which can only lead to disaster. The Board's aim will continue to be an increase of capital so that the financial position can be strong enough to meet the threat of future inflation or unforeseen major expenditure.
