ANNUAL REPORT

A few months ago Miss Elizabeth Taylor paid £92,000 for Van Gogh's well-known painting "Hospital with a view". We wonder what compensation will be paid to the Board for the view from our Hospital and Home, shown for perhaps the last time in the illustration on the cover. For our orchards are the subject of a compulsory purchase order by the Wandsworth Borough Council for housing development. It is only fair to point out that they took this course after the Board had let it be known that this land was no longer required for hospital purposes. It should also be known that the Borough Council is making every effort to meet the wishes of the Board by planning the development in such a way that the view from the Hospital will suffer as little as possible and that the amenities of spaciousness and beautiful grounds will not be interfered with.

PATIENTS

Statistics about patients make dull reading, so only the conclusions will be mentioned. The number of patients admitted is about the same as for each of the last three years, but the proportion of patients admitted suffering from disseminated sclerosis shows a sharp rise, while the number of arthritics admitted is markedly less than the average. This increase in disseminated sclerosis patients merely accentuates a trend which has been apparent for the last six years. Another deduction from statistics shows that patients are now admitted in a more advanced state of disability than seven years ago. This is probably due to the improved facilities now available from Local Authorities for disabled persons to continue to live at home—district nursing, home helps, meals on wheels, and so on. The result is that these more helpless patients need more trained nursing and more help than previously.

Looking at the financial side, 22% can afford to pay the set fees of £11 11s. 0d. a week for women and £9 9s. 0d. a week for men, which is only about three-quarters of the actual cost. Maintenance fees for another 38% are contributed by statutory bodies—again for an amount less than the actual cost, and there are still 94 patients (40%) who are unassisted and who contribute according to their means but retain sufficient pocket money for their personal expenses. There are still 22 patients who are not in a position to make any contribution. Some of these have been recently admitted, which bears out the rule that no patient will be refused admission for lack of means. In practice, the House Committee, which considers every application for admission, does not concern itself at that stage with the financial aspect.

Controlling the waiting list is a difficult task. If it is allowed to get too long (involving a wait of two or three years), the condition of the applicant is likely to have changed considerably in the waiting

period, so from time to time the House Committee regrettably decides that no more applications can be considered. While the waiting list is thus "closed", the particulars of all enquiries for admission are noted, and they are given priority when the list is again re-opened. It is a heart-rending business to turn down some of the many deserving cases which are considered, but the demand for beds is so great and the supply so limited that this course has sometimes to be followed.

PENSIONERS

Five pensioners have died during the year, and in accordance with the Board's policy these have not been replaced. Many of the remaining 112 have been visited by the Board's representatives and in some cases it has been found that they are no longer suffering from an "incurable disease". Medical science had fortunately found an answer to many ailments for which there was no known cure in the earlier part of the century. In every case, however, the pensioners have been found to be deserving of financial aid. They are just a few of the thousands of elderly men and women living out their lives without grumbling but unable to afford warm clothes or adequate heating in their homes, and certainly not small luxuries. Although care of the elderly is not part of the function of this Charity, it is felt that it would be a hardship to remove the pension from these deserving people.

In the course of these visits some instances of special hardship or some particular need has been discovered. The Board has, therefore, set aside a sum of £250 from the income of the Pension Fund to be used at the Board's discretion for such purposes. Three pensioners have already been helped in this way.

PATIENTS' ACTIVITIES

Regular readers of this report must excuse the repetition of this section, as the patients' activities do not vary greatly from year to year, but new readers will be interested to know how the patients pass their time. It is a cardinal principle that as many as possible shall be dressed and come downstairs to the day rooms and departments. It is a matter of pride that there are only about five bedridden patients. In addition to these there may be perhaps another 10 or 15 in their wards on any one day, usually because they have some temporary illness—as distinct from their permanent disability. This principle can only be followed if there are sufficient staff to help patients dress, wash, and perhaps be fed. Matron and her staff are to be congratulated that the occasions are extremely rare when this is not possible—usually because of staff illnesses. Public holidays, such as Christmas and Bank Holidays, always impose something of a strain, as naturally the non-resident helpers, of whom there are over 60, like

to spend such occasions with their own families. Sundays are also difficult, as the staff must be free to attend their own churches and the patients must be downstairs and ready for our own morning service, but the nursing staff manage somehow to achieve the almost impossible.

The majority of patients attend one or more of the treatment departments two or three times a week. Unfortunately, shortage of physiotherapy staff curtails the number of patients' attendances. It is also sad that the "production line" in the Occupational Therapy Department is also suffering from lack of suitable work. The assembly and packing of toys for Lines Brothers is no longer carried out, but a contract for Decca Ltd. has produced work for those with reasonably able hands.

Musical Therapy, under Reginald and Hebe Gibbs, is also a popular weekly occasion. Mr. and Mrs. Gibbs have now been doing this valuable work for ten years. The concerts which they organise for the patients' choir are always of a high standard, and the patients naturally enjoy singing with the professional soloists, who give their services voluntarily.

The Magic Circle gave their customary polished performance on the 3rd of November, in memory of their founder, David Devant, who spent the last years of his life as one of our patients. The occasion was marked this year by the unveiling of a plaque in his memory. The new permanent stage and stage curtains, with the new lighting, generously given by the family of Douglas Greenfield, a former patient, make it possible to offer proper facilities to all those who come to entertain the patients on Saturday afternoons. This was particularly appreciated on Founder's Day, which was celebrated on the 4th December. After the service of thanksgiving in the morning, an enjoyable variety concert in the afternoon was organised by Mr. Bernard Fillery, and in the interval of the concert the Mayor of Wandsworth presented prizes to nurses and pupil nurses.

The patients are always well entertained at Christmas with several carol choirs, and last year they added their own contribution with a Nativity Play, organised and produced by Mr. and Mrs. Reginald Gibbs and assisted by the Chaplain and children from the Parish of Wandsworth. The Mayor of Wandsworth also kindly visited the patients on Christmas Eve, and the staff entertained the patients as usual after the Christmas Day dinner. Wine was again kindly presented by Mr. Sartori from the cellars of the Coq d'Or Restaurant.

Various outings were held, notably the annual car drive organised by the Putney and Wandsworth Rotarians, which was enjoyed by over fifty patients. Other smaller outings, including the Davis Cup

European Final at Wimbledon, were made easier by the new Hospital Ambulance.

The weather was again fine for the Annual Garden Party in June. The band of the Royal Military School of Music, Kneller Hall, was ably supported by a display by the Junior Guardsmen's Corps of Drums from the Guards' Depot. The Board is most grateful to the Commandant of Kneller Hall and to the Officer Commanding Guards' Depot, for their kind permission for this entertainment.

The next Garden Party will be held on the 20th June, 1964, and the Board hopes that many readers of this report will attend.

SALE OF WORK

The annual sale of patients' work, which is organised by the Authorised Lady Visitors' Committee was changed this year from its usual two half-days to one full day. This was an experiment to see whether as good results could be obtained without upsetting the patients' routine on the second day. The Sale was opened by Lady Ackroyd, and was well attended. The results were so satisfactory that patients received the same amount of pocket money as formerly, and it has now been decided to hold a one-day Sale again next year.

STAFF

There can be few people connected with the Hospital who do not know the Steward, Mr. Layland, and all their hearts went out in sympathy to Mr. and Mrs. Layland on the tragic death of their only son Paul in June, whilst an undergraduate at Oxford. Paul himself was also widely known to patients and staff, and many of them have enjoyed watching the excellent films he took of Garden Parties and other functions at the Hospital. The Board joins their numerous other friends in extending to Mr. and Mrs. Layland its heartfelt sympathy in their loss.

Although not strictly a member of the staff, Mrs. Joyce Paterson, a Chartered Physiotherapist, worked in a voluntary capacity in our Physiotherapy Department for eighteen months. Her sudden and unexpected death came as a shock to us all. Her practical help in

the department did much to offset the shortage of staff there and enabled many more patients to receive treatment than would have been possible without her. Mrs. Paterson's family had been connected with the Hospital and Home for many years. Her husband has generously started a memorial fund to her, which will be used to help patients go on holiday.



Patients and staff will be sorry that our Chaplain has left, but congratulate him on his preferment as first Bishop in Chile and Bolivia. A large representation of Board, staff and patients attended Canon Howell's consecration by the Archbishop of Canterbury in Westminster Abbey on the 18th October. We all hope that his successor as Vicar of Wandsworth will be able to take on the work of Chaplain to the Hospital and Home in addition to his parochial duties.

During the year Sister Borwell, S.R.N. has joined as Home Sister, and Sisters Goodchild and Harper have been appointed as Ward Sisters. The Training School for pupil nurses has continued to attract applicants, and there are now 21 pupil nurses in training.

The Board has realised for some years that the retirement pensions available through the Federated Superannuation Scheme for Nurses and Hospital Officers have not kept pace with the rise in the cost of living, and a Sub-Committee was asked to consider alternative schemes. After most careful consideration the Sub-Committee has recommended that the Board should withdraw from that Scheme and join a new Scheme with the Clerical, Medical and General Life Assurance Society. This Scheme, which has now been started, will give more generous pensions than was possible under the F.S.S.N., and is fully interchangeable with the Ministry of Health Superannuation Scheme. It will cost no more to the Board than the F.S.S.N. and has been welcomed by the staff.

The Board takes this opportunity of thanking all branches of the staff for their cheerful devotion to duty throughout the year.

THE BOARD OF MANAGEMENT



The death of Mr. Norman Morris in December, 1962, was a grievous loss to his many friends on the Board, on the staff, and among the patients. Norman Morris became Chairman of the Board in January, 1948, at a time when the momentous decision had to be made of whether to apply to remain out of the National Health Service. This decision was, of course, influenced by the uncertain financial future of voluntary hospitals. There seemed to be little doubt that the Hospital and Home would continue to provide a more personal service on the original lines if it continued on a voluntary basis, but would the money

be forthcoming to meet the rising costs of inflation? It was largely due to Norman Morris's influence and leadership that the bold decision was made to remain outside the National Health Service, a decision which no-one now regrets. It was also due to Norman Morris, largely in conjunction with Sir Francis Glyn, our Treasurer in those days, that a new financial policy was initiated which has been successful in meeting the vastly increased annual cost.

One of the kindest of men, sympathetic and generous, it is no wonder that Norman Morris was so much loved and respected. He died only a few weeks after the death of his devoted wife, Una, without whom he had no interest in living.

The Board also regrets to announce that Colonel Geoffrey Phillips will not be standing for re-election at the Annual General Meeting. Colonel Phillips has been on the Board and a member of the House Committee for twenty-six years. Ill-health now makes it impossible for him to attend meetings regularly.

The Board is glad to welcome as one of its members Mr. Anthony Talbot Reed, a great-great-grandson of our Founder, Dr. Andrew Reed. It is interesting to trace the connection of the Founder's family with the Hospital and Home. Dr. Andrew Reed's second son, who became Sir Charles Reed, M.P., was a member of the Board from 1856 to 1881. His second son, Talbot Baines Reed (author of "The Fifth Form at St. Dominic's" and other books for boys) followed in his father's footsteps in helping for some years to administer the Charity, while another grandson of the Founder—Eliot Pye-

Smith Reed—was also a member of the Board for no less than twenty-eight years. He died in 1930; so after a gap of thirty-three years the direct connection of the Reed family with the Hospital and Home has been renewed. It is not only as Founder's kin that Mr. Anthony T. Reed is welcome; his professional experience as a Chartered Accountant makes him a valuable member of the Finance Committee.

The House Committee has also been strengthened by the election of Mr. John Nigel Mendelssohn, whose industrial experience has already proved valuable.

COUNTY COMMITTEES

It is sad that there are still only two County or Local Committees, Surrey and London, but it is encouraging to know that Lady Sarah FitzAlan-Howard will be raising a Committee in West Sussex in the New Year and there is every hope that others will soon be formed in the North-West.

The London and Surrey Committees have again been enthusiastically busy. The outstanding event was the Annual Ball, which was organised by the Surrey Committee under the chairmanship of Mrs. Habershon. This event alone raised nearly £2,000. Numerous smaller functions have been organised by both Committees. The financial success of the Garden Party is largely due to the stalls organised by both Committees, though Matron's stall won by a short head this year. The amounts raised by both Committees have been included in this year's accounts in the County Committee figures, though in the previous year they were credited to "Entertainments".

The Board is most grateful to the Chairman and members of both Surrey and London Committees for all the hard work and time which they devote each year to the support of the Hospital and Home.

FINANCE

Little comment is necessary to explain the accounts, which are published on pages 16-19. The outstanding figure is the sum of over £101,000 received from legacies. This is nearly twice the average for the last ten years. It is a pity that it is too late to thank those who have remembered the Hospital and Home so generously in their wills. As the accounts show, we rely on legacies to a large extent, and we confidently hope and pray that all those who have the interests of the Hospital and Home at heart will make some provision in their wills for the continuation of the support which they give during their lifetime.

Apart from legacies, income shows a modest increase of 2%, while expenditure has increased by 4%. Once again salaries and wages account for 60% of the total expenditure; after this come the cost of provisions (12%) and improvements to the buildings (9%).

The balance sheet also shows a satisfactory position, and it is gratifying to see that the market value of the funds on 30th September, 1963, was £907,528, the highest figure ever recorded and £132,521 more than in the previous year.

Much has been done in the last few years to bring the main building up to a satisfactory standard. The re-wiring of the electrical installation is almost complete, including a new nurse-call system and a new wireless rediffusion for all beds. Now the spotlight is being turned on staff accommodation. Without enough staff of the right quality the work of the Hospital and Home would grind to a halt: to attract good staff is therefore one of the most important duties of the Board, and accounts for the decision to build modern accommodation for married staff and for senior single nursing staff. Messrs. A. H. Devereux & Partners have been appointed Architects for this purpose, and a new Head Gardener's Cottage is already being built. Other plans are in hand, and work will soon start on projects which will cost some £60,000. It is to meet this expenditure that the Board appeals this year to all those who read this Annual Report to be as generous as they can afford in their covenanted subscriptions and donations.
