**The Board of Management with humble duty respectfully dedicate this edition of their annual report to Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth The Queen Mother in celebration of Her Majesty's 80th birthday.**

*The patronage and interest shown by the Royal Family in the affairs of the RHHI has always been greatly prized by the patients and all those connected with the charity.*

**1980 also marks the centenary of Royal Patronage as it was in 1880 that HRH The Prince of Wales (later HM King Edward VII) became our first Royal Patron.**

In recent years we have been greatly favoured to receive a visit from HM The Queen in May 1976 to open the Chatsworth Wing, from HM Queen Elizabeth The Queen Mother in 1973 and again from Her Majesty in January 1980 when she graced the Royal Gala, Charity performance of 'Die Fledermaus' at the Royal Opera House, Covent Garden. This event, for which the hospital and the trust are deeply indebted to Haslemere Estates, raised £100,000 towards the new wing now completed.

Finally, it has given everyone the greatest pleasure that this wing — to be known as the 'Alexandra Wing' — was opened by HRH Princess Alexandra on the 11th of December 1980.

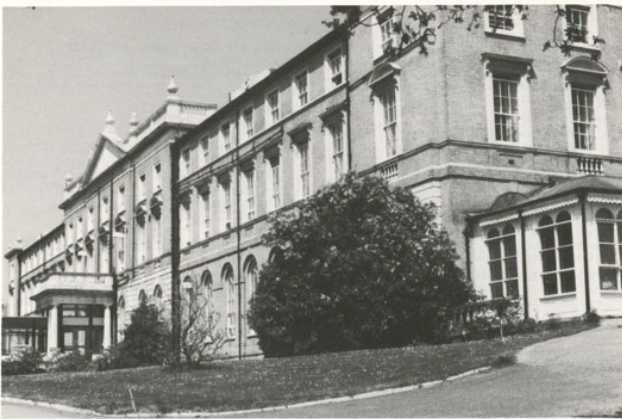

## A Difficult Year

### Spiralling costs

In common with all other charities making ends meet—never easy—has been immeasurably more difficult this year owing to the sharp inflationary increases in the cost of wages, goods and services. However, thanks to a prudent Finance Committee all remedial action possible was taken early in the year. The liquidity position was improved and belts were tightened in every aspect of the hospital's administration. In no case has any economy been made which would affect the standard of patient care.

### Help from health and local authorities

Because of the difficulties facing us an approach was made early in the year to those health and local authorities who assist us with the cost of care of the majority of our patients. In the past years we have always re-negotiated such contributions annually in September but this year it was done at the six month point. We then estimated that to get us through the remainder of the financial year it would be necessary to raise the cost of care if we were not to finish the year with a heavy deficit. Despite their own financial difficulties we received a prompt and sympathetic response to our appeal for which we are very grateful.

### National status

The Royal Hospital now cares for patients from some 65 different health and local authorities throughout the United Kingdom and it is a source of the greatest satisfaction to the Board of Management that the facilities the charity is able to provide for our patients continue to have such a nation wide appeal.

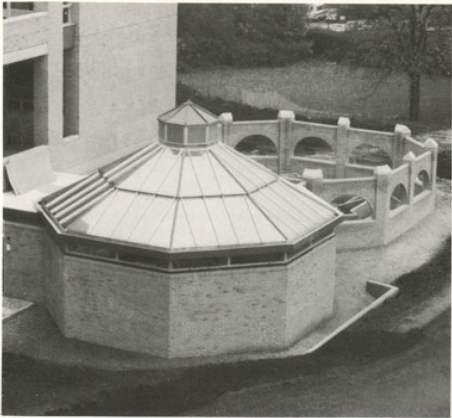
### Capital expenditure

Despite the unfortunate financial climate the Board of Management has vigorously pressed on with the construction of the new combined therapy and research wing.

Notwithstanding the temptation to do so there has been no reduction in standards or cut back in facilities. The wing was finished by the end of November and the Board was immensely encouraged to learn of HRH Princess Alexandra's gracious intention of opening it on the 11th December and allowing it to bear her name.

### The cost

The total cost of the Alexandra Wing will be £1,500,000. The money, initially, has been found from the charity's invested funds and to date £1,000,000 has been spent in this way. The Trust, under the inspired guidance of its Chairman, Mr Jack van Zwanenberg, has already raised

£600,000 towards this sum, but we obviously still have a long way to go. Donations to the Development Trust for the Young Disabled will, therefore, be most gratefully received from our readers.

#### Special thanks

This is due in very great measure to all who have helped us so far. We have necessarily not only set the vital target for our special appeal to make good the inroads now being made in our invested funds, but also to create a fund so that specialised work on research, quite unconnected from the day to day running of the hospital, may go ahead as rapidly as possible. Finally, the Board are only too well aware that this fine new building will have to be maintained and run, and it is their hope that a special research orientated fund for this purpose may quickly be established through the generosity of our many benefactors.

## Research

### Developing programme

A good start has been made and a number of projects are already under way under the able direction of the Director of Medical and Research Services, Dr John Wedgwood. The move into Alexandra Wing will clearly

greatly facilitate this work which has to date, been handicapped by lack of space and technical equipment.

### Primary research aim

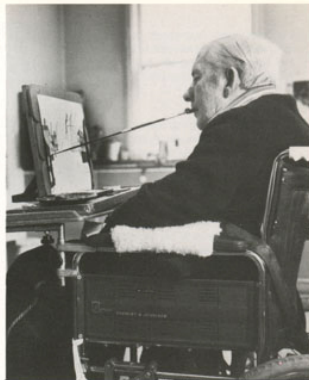
This continues to be directed towards improving the quality of life of all patients to the highest point achievable whether this be related to mobility, comprehension, speech or a combination of all three.

### Teaching

This role will also be developed to make the greatest possible use of the most modern lecturing and demonstration facilities now to be amply available in Alexandra Wing. A start has already been made and a number of medical and nursing seminars held. More are to follow. In addition, with the approval of the Joint Board of

Clinical Nursing Studies, a course for Enrolled Nurses has already been successfully completed, a second course for Registered Nurses is now under way and similar courses will follow.

The Board is also very pleased to announce that the Pharmaceutical Society of Great Britain has approved the Pharmacy Department of the RHHI for pre-registration training of post-graduate Pharmacists under the direction of our Chief Pharmacist, Mr K H Rohlfing.

## Our Patients

### Admissions

44 patients have been admitted and their average age has been 47 years. The overall age throughout the hospital covering all 275 patients is 58 years.

### Holidays

In addition to patients' own privately arranged holidays we have been able to offer 99 holidays again this year in relief of those caring for the disabled in the community. These include the transfer of our own patients to the John Howard House annexe for a ten day change of the air at Brighton.

### Day Patients

This scheme has continued and there have been 1,103 attendances during the year.

Day patients are allotted to a ward and have the opportunity of taking part in all the normal therapy facilities available and also attending outings and diversions being arranged if they so wish.

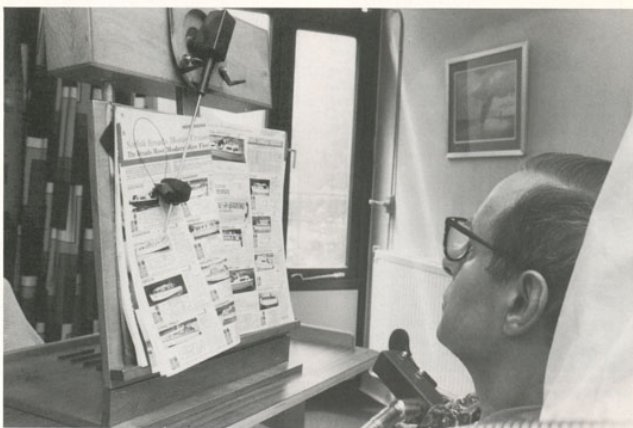
## Staff

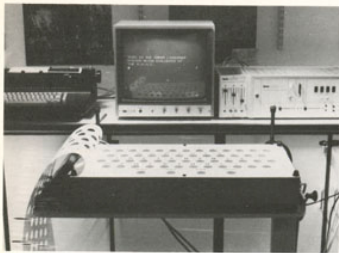
*But beyond this, his hard work and energy has been coupled with a clear understanding of what the RHHI stands for and has been of immense benefit to us all.*
