ANNUAL REPORT

This has been a year of activity. The Development Committee has met frequently under the Chairman to consider all aspects of the work. Suggestions were invited from patients and all grades of staff, and many of these have already been put into effect. On the larger issues there has been much detailed planning.

One of the first decisions was that the Occupational Therapy Department urgently needed more space, and as a temporary measure a new hut has been erected where light industrial work is now carried on during mornings and afternoons. Before the hut was available it was only possible to allot the morning for this work for a limited number of patients. The hut has not only made it possible to increase the number of patients engaged in the "Production Line" but makes it possible to take more patients in a variety of crafts.

The next decision by the Development Committee was that the Laundry must be modernised as a matter of urgency. This work started in October and will be finished by Christmas. It involves many new machines and a new steam boiler. By careful planning

it has been possible to continue throughout with the work of the laundry. The overall cost will be about £16,000.

Other plans which have already been put into practice include the modernisation of all bathrooms and lavatories throughout the Home. This is an ambitious scheme involving the installation of a number of mechanical devices such as electric hoists in all bathrooms, which will make it easier for heavy patients to be handled by the nursing staff. Special attention has also been paid to heating, ventilation and lighting, and the overall cost exceeds £40,000.

The re-organisation of wards and the integration of the Departments of Physiotherapy and Occupational Therapy into a Department of Physical Medicine, are major projects still under active consideration. Both are urgent: the ward organisation so that Ward Sisters can have fewer patients under their care, which must result in an improved service to patients: the Department of Physical Medicine so that the most modern methods of treatment can be used in the most efficient way.

The new staff flats are now completed and some already occupied. The flat reserved for the use of friends and relatives of

patients had its first occupants in mid-October. This flat has been fully and comfortably furnished from a generous anonymous donation, for which the Board is most grateful. From the bookings and enquiries already received there is no doubt that it will fill a long felt want.

PATIENTS

We admitted 36 new patients during the year of whom 25 were women and 11 were men. The average age of the women was 63; that of the men 50. Once again following the trend of the last seven years, we have admitted more cases of multiple sclerosis than any other disability.

The scheme for modernising the bathrooms will make it necessary to reduce the number of patients by 14, and this has already been partly achieved by not filling vacant beds. There were, therefore, 242 patients in the Home on 1st October. Of these 42 pay the set fee of 11 guineas a week, 22 are the financial responsibility of the Ministry of Health, and 89 are sponsored by Local Authorities, who pay only part of the cost. The remaining 89 patients contribute what they can afford, but the Board is careful to ensure that all patients keep enough money for their personal use.

Patients' holidays still present a problem, but this has been partly solved by having an arrangement with Lulworth Court, Westcliff-on-Sea, that they will reserve for our use one bed throughout the year. For this concession we are very grateful to Dorincourt Estates. It is hoped to make similar arrangements with other organisations which have seaside holiday homes, as there is no doubt that two weeks change of air, food and companions is good for everyone.

PATIENTS' ACTIVITIES

The new Occupational Therapy hut is already making a considerable difference to the lives of those patients who are able to partake in light industrial work and, by freeing space for other forms of occupational therapy, to many others who benefit by craft work. It has also freed another room which can be used exclusively for such special work as pottery and the art class. That class, which has now been in existence for a year, is a popular weekly event for the 14 patients who regularly attend for instruction from Mr. Young, an L.C.C. art teacher, who is assisted regularly by Lady Gracey, herself a talented artist.

Another innovation is the Saturday morning Bingo, which has proved so popular in the few weeks it has been held that a larger room must be found to accommodate all the patients who want to attend. The Board is most grateful to the Putney Toc H for running

the Bingo. Three or four members of the Branch turn up every Saturday morning to organise it and to help those patients who find difficulty in marking their cards.

The Music Therapy choir recently celebrated its 10th anniversary by a rendering of Hiawatha's Wedding Feast. Reginald and Hebe Gibbs, who have been responsible for our music therapy since it was started in 1955, continue to inspire enthusiasm and to produce a high standard of singing.

The Garden Party was held on the 12th June, at which Anna Massey was an attractive and popular principal guest. She and the other numerous guests watched an exhilarating display of gymnastics given by the Army School of Physical Training from Aldershot. Some of the team had competed at the Olympic Games at Tokyo, and the Board is most grateful to the Commandant of the School, as well as to the members of the team, for their polished display. Once again, music was provided by a band from the Royal Military School of Music at Kneller Hall. It is wonderful the way the students of this school are prepared to give up one of their summer Saturday afternoons, year after year, to help make our Garden Party such an enjoyable affair.

Other activities continue as for many years. It is some time since mention was made in this report of the Tea Parties which are regularly organised twice a year for the patients by the Authorised Lady Visitors. At these tea parties the Authorised Lady Visitors prepare a tea of sandwiches and cakes, which the Visitors themselves take round and serve to the patients in day rooms. An orchestral trio, under Mr. E. W. Harvey, plays light music in the two main day rooms during the afternoon, and Miss Patricia Riley's programme of songs also gives great pleasure in the Patients' Dining-room.

STAFF

We were all sorry to say goodbye to Sister Halpin, who had been Administrative Sister for over six years, and has now retired to her native Ireland. In her place we welcome Sister Ferguson. We are glad to have Sister Bishop back on the permanent staff after a short break. Sister Linford has also joined us as Night Sister.

Mrs. Plummer had been our radiographer for fifteen years but has now decided to change her profession for teaching, in which we wish her success: Mrs. Kingdon has taken her place. We also welcome Miss Greenwood who has replaced Mrs. Platts as our Speech Therapist.

Mrs. LeGrys has carried the Salaries and Wages Department capably on her broad shoulders for 8 years during which time she has coped efficiently with an increased volume of work. We wish her

well in her retirement, and in her place we welcome Mr. Hall, who has come from industry. It is hoped that the installation of a Burroughs sensimatic accounting machine will help to reduce the ever increasing and more complicated work of that department.

Brigadier Long has continued to run the Appeals Department without a permanent Assistant Appeals Secretary, but he could not have done this without the valuable help freely given by Mr. Robinson. Not only did he run the Alexandra Rose Day, which incidentally was £100 up on last year, but he was responsible for the Spring Fair on the day. He has been of invaluable assistance in helping at various London and Surrey Committee functions, and the Board is most grateful to him.

The recruitment of nursing staff continues to be difficult, but the Nurse Training School has undoubtedly helped with young pupil nurses. During the year 12 pupil nurses entered the preliminary training school, and we have on the staff 18 who have either qualified or are still undergoing training.

There is no doubt that the new staff flats will make it easier to find the more senior staff. All the flats have been allocated and it is already apparent that more would be filled if they were available.

It is in the recruiting of junior staff, such as domestics and porters, that a real problem lies. Automation in the form of washing-up machines in all ward kitchens and pantries, as well as electric

floor scrubbing machines, has been introduced during the year, but there is still a serious shortage of suitable staff to do the work. An indication of the seriousness of the problem is that the Board spent no less than £1,400 this year in advertising staff vacancies. The fact that other hospitals are having the same difficulties is poor consolation.

BOARD OF MANAGEMENT

When General Sir Horatius Murray was elected Chairman he expressed the wish that there should be a Vice-Chairman in view of the considerable amount of time which he, as Chairman, would have to devote to future planning. Mr. Parrington, who had been a member of the Board and House Committee for six years, was elected to fill this new post.

Everyone was sorry when Brigadier Stokes-Roberts announced that he felt it wise to vacate the important office as Chairman of the House Committee, a post which he had held for five years. We are glad that Brigadier Stokes-Roberts will remain a member of the Board and of the Finance Committee, so we shall continue to benefit from his long experience. Mrs. Habershon, who has been on the Board and House Committee since 1960, and who has been Chairman of the Surrey Committee for nine years, has been elected Chairman of the House Committee.

For some years now neither Sir Cyril Black nor Sir Hugh Linstead have been able to afford the time to attend Board or Committee meetings. Sir Cyril joined the Board in April, 1949, and has been most helpful in offering advice whenever needed, and in particular on the sale of land a few years ago. Sir Hugh, who joined the Board in 1947, has been equally approachable and helpful, especially when it was decided to modernise and re-equip the Pharmacy. Both now feel that their places on the Board should be filled by others who have more time to devote to the various committees, which are necessarily increased in numbers and duties.

Lady Newnes and Sir Richard Winstedt have also resigned from the Board owing to ill health. As a member of the Board since 1952, Lady Newnes has devoted much time and energy to various functions and business of the Board: Sir Richard has been a member since 1941, and it has been some years since he has been well enough to attend meetings.

The Board is most grateful to these four retiring members for all they have done for the Hospital and Home, and accepts their resignations with regret.

Two new members have been nominated by the Board for election at the Annual General Meeting; Mrs. Lyall, who has been an active member of the London Committee since its formation in 1958

and is now its Chairman, and Mrs. Smitherman, who has been equally active on the Surrey Committee and has also assisted the House Committee in the past by visiting prospective patients near her home.

COUNTY COMMITTEES

The London and Surrey Committees have once again worked hard to raise money. In the past years the Surrey Committee concentrated mainly on one large function—the Annual Ball in the Hospital and Home. This year they decided not to have a ball, but to organise a number of smaller functions throughout the County. Their experiment has been a success, as the 15 functions, which included a Fashion Show by Clive of Hanover Square, a concert by Tamas Vasary, and an Antique Dealers Fair in Farnham Castle, and a cookery demonstration by Marguerite Patten, have shown a total profit of over £3,600 to which must be added the amount raised by the Surrey Committee stall at the Garden Party, bringing the total to nearly £4,000.

The main function organised by the London Committee was the Bridge Drive at the Mansion House, organised by Mrs. Lyall and her Committee. The total of £600 was proof of all the hard work which they put into the organisation. Other functions earned a further £300, and the London Committee stall at the Garden Party brought in an additional £660.

SALE OF WORK

The annual Sale of Work was held on Thursday, 21st October, and was opened by Lady Buckhurst. The target of "over £1,000" was again reached, and, as usual, the proceeds will be distributed personally to the patients by the organisers. The Board congratulates Miss Dean, the Chairman of the Sale Committee, and all her hard-working colleagues, on achieving such a satisfactory result.

LIBRARY

The library has always played an important part in the patients' lives. Just how important this is can be measured by figures: there are over 3,500 volumes, and 191 patients are regular borrowers. It may not be generally known that this library is run on entirely voluntary lines, the librarians attending twice a week to exchange patients' books. For the last fifteen years, Mrs. Dawney has been in charge of the library, with a rota of ten assistants, but in the summer of this year, Mrs. Dawney left Putney to live in Yorkshire, so had to give up this work. This was a great loss as Mrs. Dawney knew the literary tastes of all her readers and was personally responsible for selecting new books and for keeping the catalogue up-to-date. The Board takes this opportunity of thanking Mrs. Dawney and all her librarians for this labour of love. We are fortunate indeed that Mrs. Robinson, who had already worked with Mrs. Dawney for seven years, has nobly offered to take over the responsibility for the library.

It is well known that the price of books has soared in recent years. The House Committee has therefore increased its grant from the Funds towards the purchase of books, but gifts of books which are in good condition, are perhaps the most welcome of all gifts.

FINANCE

Expenditure of £258,000 was £25,000 more than in the previous year (10%). Of this increase, £18,700 was on salaries and wages. The remainder includes £2,000 spent on mechanising the Salaries and Wages Department, where the work has increased steadily over the years. When the new mechanised system is in full use, it is anticipated that it will be possible to reduce the staff of that department.

To set against this increased expenditure, income (excluding legacies) has risen by £11,000 (6%) to £186,838. Still excluding legacies, there was therefore a deficit of £71,000. Fortunately, legacies at £100,000 have more than covered the deficit and it has been possible to add some £28,000 to the capital funds. Dependence on legacies to such an extent is unsatisfactory, as it is impossible to forecast how much is likely to be received. This year they have reached a figure which is double the average for the last ten years. The Board would like to thank all those who may have advised the benefactors, and sincerely hopes that all those who have the interests of this Hospital and Home at heart will make some provision in their wills for a continuation of the work.

The balance sheet continues to show a strong position. Excluding the Development Fund, the cost of investments has risen by some £28,000, though the capital value has fallen by £43,000, in line with the Stock Market generally.

The Development Fund, arising from compensation paid by the Wandsworth Borough Council for the compulsory purchase of some ten acres of land, shows a decrease of £39,000, due to the capital expenditure incurred in building flats for single and married staff, though the income from this capital has been added to the principal. When these flats are finished and paid for there will still be a capital sum of £240,000 for future development.

Looking to the new year, the total estimated expenditure is £291,000, an increase of £33,000 on the past year. Estimated income, excluding legacies, is £187,000, which leaves an estimated deficit of over £100,000 on the year. The Board is giving serious consideration on how to increase income to meet this necessary expenditure. It relies, as it always has done, on the generosity of its supporters, who have never yet failed to give whole-heartedly to such a worthy cause.
