ANNUAL REPORT

\*\*\* "Well furnished with a good standard of service, including portage, at all times; modern beds with a reasonable proportion of twin-bedded rooms, and hot and cold running water in all bedrooms; sufficient bathrooms and lavatories on all floors, with modern sanitary fittings; comfortable and well appointed lounges, with good lighting and heating; attractive well-served food, including hot meals with a good choice of dishes, available to residents and non-residents at all reasonable times."

Does the Royal Hospital and Home measure up to the standard of a 3-star A.A. Hotel? Some patients might query a few items, but generally speaking the Board of Management has, over the last five years or so, done so much to improve the interior of the Home that an impartial judge would probably up-grade it from 2 to 3 stars. Some of the improvements deserve special mention: two modern lifts for patients and two for goods; a new fire alarm system connected up to the Nurses Home and new fire fighting equipment throughout; new floor coverings in all corridors and in many rooms, and most rooms redecorated; new dispensary; new ladies' hair-dressing room with modern equipment. These are some of the improvements which have benefited the patients and which now make it a pleasure to show visitors round. In addition, the whole electrical installation is now being re-wired and modernised, including a new nurse-call system of lights and bells and with new equipment for radio relay to each bed.

A new system of catering has also resulted in improvements to the quality of the food. In April 1962, the Board engaged Peter Merchant Ltd. to be responsible for the catering. The change from having our own catering officer and kitchen staff to contract catering was not made without much thought and some misgivings by the House Committee, but the first six months have shown the change to have been well worth-while; the menus are more varied, the food better cooked and served hotter, and there is less waste. The cost of provisions and wages has not risen, and the Board is satisfied that the management fee payable to Peter Merchant is money well spent.

The staff has not been overlooked in the over-all plan to improve conditions. The patients could not be cared for without a good and adequate staff, and good staff will only work in modern conditions and with up-to-date equipment. In common with most other hospitals these days, the Board depends to a greater extent than ever before on part-time non-resident staff, and therefore a new staff changing room and a rest-room for non-residents have been provided and equipped. Washing-up machines for crockery and cutlery, electric floor polishers and other labour saving devices have been installed.

The internal telephone system has been extended, and more extensions have been provided for the G.P.O. telephones through a larger switchboard.

These are some of the achievements, but the Board is not complacent. There is still much to be done; in particular an integrated department of physical medicine has long been recommended by the Medical Staff Committee, where physiotherapy and occupational therapy can be given to more patients than can now be accommodated, and with closer co-operation between these two branches of physical medicine than is now possible. Various plans have been drawn up over the years, but the cost has been prohibitive and the plans have been shelved until the Board can see the way clearly to raising some £70,000 without depleting the capital funds.

#### PATIENTS

55 patients were admitted during the year. Their average age was 59 years. 17 of these suffer from Rheumatoid Arthritis, 20 from Disseminated Sclerosis and 18 from other disabilities.

Arthritis still forms the largest group (80), followed by Disseminated Sclerosis (61). So these two ailments fill 60% of our beds. 88 patients have been in the Hospital and Home for under two years, but we still have 76 who have been patients for over 10 years.

The Board decided in November 1961, to increase the number of beds available to those who can pay the set fee (£11 11s. 0d. a week for women and £9 9s. 0d. a week for men), but that those admitted on these terms would be accommodated throughout the Hospital wherever beds were vacant. Some progress has been made towards the permitted figure, but 80% of the beds are still occupied by those who are not in a position to pay the full fees. The number of patients sponsored by Local Authorities has risen to 69; so with the 20 paid for by the Regional Hospital Board, and 2 war disability pensioners paid for by the Ministry of Health, payment for 139 patients is assured, and this accounts for the high figure shown in the accounts as receipts for services rendered. It should however be pointed out that receipts for none of these categories meet the full cost of keeping a patient. The remaining 103 patients all contribute what they can afford out of their income, but retain sufficient pocket money for their personal expenses.

#### PENSIONERS

The foundation of pensions is as old as the foundation of the Hospital and Home. In the original constitution framed by Dr. Andrew Reed in 1854, he referred to them as "extra patients" and described them as "those only needing partial relief who can still find aid and comfort in the bosom of their families".

Over the course of years capital sums have been given or bequeathed specifically for pensions, and the income from this capital must be spent in that way. A small surplus at the end of this financial year has been defrayed by sending to each of the 119 pensioners an extra gift of thirty shillings to buy winter comforts. The letters of thanks received have been most touching, and show how much even a small sum is valued by our pensioners. The Board has also decided to send a small Christmas present to each pensioner.

No new pensioners have been elected for 12 years, but the time has now come when the income from the pension fund is sufficient to meet existing pensions, and the Board will be considering the best way of allotting pensions to fill future vacancies.

#### MEDICAL TREATMENT

There have been no changes during the year in the scope of medical treatment available to all patients, but it will interest new readers of the Annual Report to know what is provided.

The Medical Staff Committee, whose names are shown on page 3, advise the Board on the whole aspect of medical care. Dr. V. Kendall, who is Medical Officer to the establishment, attends daily and is on call at all times. She refers patients to consultants who visit them in the Hospital and Home at her request. When surgical treatment is advised arrangements are made for the patient to be admitted to a National Health Service Hospital temporarily.

Dr. Kendall co-ordinates the activities of the departments under her supervision, including the Pharmacy, the X-Ray Department, the Physiotherapy and Occupational Therapy Departments.

The Board has recently appointed Dr. Maureen Tudor to assist Dr. Kendall in a part-time capacity as the medical work at the Hospital has increased so much in recent years.

Specialist clinics are also held weekly in the Hospital and Home, including Ophthalmic, Dental, Speech Therapy and Chiropody. Thus all the supplementary services of the National Health Service are available to the patients at the appropriate charges paid by those living in their own homes.

The Board has received with regret the resignation of Mr. G. W. Hinde, who has been visiting Dental Surgeon since 1958. The Board hopes to appoint a successor shortly.

#### PATIENTS' ACTIVITIES

"Oh, Matron, I haven't got any time for anything else" was one patient's reply recently, when asked if she would like to join a group. It was a reply which brought satisfaction to those who organize activities. No one should imagine that our patients sit around all day with nothing to do. Many attend for treatment two



or three times a week; a few take part in light industrial work—more would be able to do so if there were more accommodation available; many do embroidery or other needlework on their own, making things for the annual Sale of Work; others may be writing letters on typewriters which they have learnt, or re-learnt, to use. In the afternoons there is always a full house at the weekly cinema show, or at the Saturday concert; on Wednesdays about thirty patients attend Musical Therapy, which has lately extended its activities from singing to include a percussion band. Men's and women's branches of TOC H meet regularly, and the Guides' Tea Parties are always popular. It is not surprising therefore that visitors sometimes remark that they can never find their patient alone.

Turning to specific events during the year, there have been a number of outings by coach and car during the summer; the car outing, organised annually by the Rotary Club, took sixty-one patients in about forty cars to Hindhead on the 5th of July. Our patients have also enjoyed outings organised by the Trefoil Guild, and another to the Battersea Fun Fair organised by the Multiple Sclerosis Society. Twelve patients went to the Royal Tournament on the 20th July, and about fifty were entertained to tea and to watch a cricket match by our good neighbours, Whitelands College. Coach outings to Brighton have also been much appreciated.

Indoor entertainments have included a Home and Away Quiz against patients of the British Home and Hospital at Streatham, two special tea parties given by the Authorised Lady Visitors, and a most enjoyable performance given by The Magic Circle—an annual event in memory of David Devant, who was a patient in the Hospital and Home until his death.

Founder's Day was celebrated on 5th December. On this day the Chaplain conducted a special service attended by a full congregation of patients, members of the Board and representatives of the Staff. In the afternoon the Mayor and Mayoress of Wandsworth presented prizes to the nurses in the interval of an enjoyable concert. The guests invited to this concert are some of those who have helped the Hospital and Home in a voluntary capacity during the year. The Board's thanks are again due to all voluntary workers, on whom the patients depend, and especial mention should be made of the Authorised Lady Visitors and Librarians.

The photograph of Princess Marina signing the Visitors' Book in the Library was taken on Alexandra Rose Day when Her Royal Highness, accompanied by the Mayor of Wandsworth, visited the Depot at the Hospital and Home. The Princess spared the time in a busy day to speak to several of the patients.

The takings from the Annual Sale of Work held on 31st October and 1st November, 1962, must be nearly a record, and the Sale of Work Committee is to be congratulated and thanked for all the work which was necessary to achieve such a success. Mrs. R. A. Butler opened the Sale on the first day with her accustomed charm, and the Board is most grateful to her for sparing the time to attend, to all who organised it, and to those who came and spent so liberally.

#### STAFF

Everyone was delighted to know that Sister Chapman, who has been on the staff for eight years, had been appointed Assistant Matron

in the place of Mrs. Wedderburn, who had resigned. The return of Sister Phillips to full time nursing has also given much pleasure to patients and to her colleagues on the staff.

The recruitment of trained nursing staff has improved lately, possibly as a result of the Board's decision to supplement the pension earned through superannuation by a retiring gratuity, subject to certain conditions of age and service on the staff of the R.H.H.I. Nurses' pay and the general question of staff remuneration has, and will continue to have, the Board's close attention.

The number of junior nursing staff and pupil nurses continues to be barely adequate, but wards are kept up to strength by the employment of a large number of part-time helpers who work either morning or evening sessions. Their willing and sympathetic hands help patients in dressing, washing, and in the service of breakfast and supper in the wards.

The Board's decision to employ Peter Merchant Ltd. as Catering Contractors from April 1962, necessitated the resignation of Miss P. Williams, who had been catering officer for 4½ years. The Board takes this opportunity of wishing Miss Williams happiness in her new sphere of work with the Malcolm Clubs.

#### COUNTY COMMITTEES

The London and Surrey Committees have continued to work with unabated enthusiasm. Both Committees organised stalls at the Garden Party, and these were largely responsible for the successful financial result.

An outstanding event was a concert given in June by Yehudi and Hephzibah Menuhin in the hall of the Worshipful Company of Grocers in the presence of the Princess Royal. The Countess of Munster of the Surrey Committee was Chairman, and nearly five hundred fortunate guests were privileged to hear the nearest approach to perfection on a concert platform which any human may ever attain. It might have been possible to fill the Festival Hall for such an occasion, but the intimate setting of the Grocers' Hall was the perfect venue for such a recital. Three patients were able to attend, and two photographs show Her Royal Highness and Menuhins talking to Miss PUNCHARD and Mr. LANGSTON.

Both Committees have organised many smaller functions; the bridge party at the Turf Club, organised by Mrs. Lyall of the London Committee, is always well attended; concerts, floral lunches and jumble sales all take time to organise, and the Board is most grateful to all who give their time and ability so willingly to raise funds and at the same time give publicity to the Hospital and Home.

Two other functions must be mentioned, though not organised by the County Committees; Richard Ogden, the well-known jeweller in Burlington Arcade, held a diamond bran tub in his shop over a period of weeks. Every dip won a prize, and the entire proceeds were given to the Hospital and Home. The other function was a benefit night at Crockfords. Our photograph on page 14 shows Mr. T. Holland, Chairman of Crockfords, presenting a cheque for £1,860 to our President, The Duke of Devonshire, at the Hospital and Home. The Board is most grateful to the Chairman and Directors of Crockfords for selecting this Charity on this occasion.

### HOSPITAL LAND

Reference has already been made in the national and local press to the possible sale of part of the hospital land for development. Following an application by the Board to have the area of the orchard re-zoned for residential purposes, the Wandsworth Borough Council has served a compulsory purchase order to acquire 10½ acres. At the time of going to press, the Board has lodged an objection to the order. As the matter is therefore *sub judice* it would be improper to make further comment, but Governors can be assured that the Board will do its best to ensure that the amenities of open spaces and good views will be preserved. The Board has always had the friendliest relations with the Borough Council, and is confident that the Council will do everything possible to meet the Board's requirements in this matter.

Financially, the Board would gain by receiving compensation at current market rates for building land. If an appreciable capital sum is paid by the Council for this land, part of it could be used for two projects which have had to be shelved recently for lack of funds; the first would be to build on a new integrated department of Physical

Medicine, incorporating our present inadequate physiotherapy and occupational therapy departments; the second would be the building of accommodation for married staff. Both projects are urgently necessary; the first to make available to all patients the best possible medical treatment; the second, to secure good staff, on whom the patients' welfare entirely depends.

### FINANCE

Once again there has been a welcome increase in income, which has risen by 18% over the previous year. This increase is reflected under all three main headings—voluntary gifts, payments by or on behalf of patients, and dividends. Legacies received reached the satisfactory total of almost £70,000, compared to an average of £45,000 over the last seven years.

Expenditure has, of course, also increased, but only by some 10% over the previous year. "Of course" because this year, as in every year since the war, salaries and wages account for most of this increase. The Board welcomes the 7½% increase awarded to nurses. Other staff, mostly in the lower paid grades, have also had increases which the Board has paid ungrudgingly, but it must be accepted that the cost of running this Hospital and Home will continue to increase year by year if only for that reason. Salaries and wages now total the unprecedented figure of £124,000 or 56% of the total expenditure. The Board is proud to be in a position to make these payments without the embarrassment of continuously raising the fees, and without the necessity of reducing the number of patients. As the ceiling may also have been reached in income from invested capital, the Board must look to an increase in voluntary gifts to balance the accounts.

### TERMS OF ADMISSION

The Board of Management always has in mind that the Royal Hospital and Home for Incurables, Putney, is a charitable institution and no applicant will be refused admission because of lack of means. The Board will, however, require a contribution from patients if it appears to the Board that the means of the applicant or of any person responsible for his maintenance are such as to render a contribution just and proper.

A limited number of beds is available for those who can afford to pay a full set fee. The inclusive fees are determined by the Board of Management, and at present are fixed at eleven guineas or nine guineas per week.

Sympathetic consideration will also be given to applications from those recommended by Local Authorities, for whom the Local Authorities will pay a maintenance fee amounting to approximately half the full cost of their support.
