REPORT

For Year ended September 80th, 1915,

Presentation at the Annual General Meeting, November 26th, 1915.

THIS Report for the year ended on September 30th, 1915, shall be brief.

Death of a Member o We have again to record the loss of a most valued member of the Board. Colonel Holland, who served the Hospital for seventeen years, died very suddenly while present at a meeting of the House Committee on November 11th last. By that time the Annual Report for the year 1914 had been printed. The Chairman paid a touching tribute to the deceased gentleman at the last Annual Meeting, and in the course of his remarks described him as "a distinguished member of a distinguished family." Colonel Holland, by his sterling integrity, faithful work, true friendship, unvarying loyalty, large-hearted charity and

reverent love for this Hospital and all the good causes he served, made many friends. He was not led by his fears, but by his hopes.

Death of the Late Steward. Mr. Joseph Watts, who for thirty-one years was the Steward of this Hospital, and who retired in June, 1912, died at Uxbridge on the 30th of November last. He was extremely ill for many months. A note of appreciation concerning Mr. Watts' many good qualities appeared in the Annual Report for the year 1912.

The Year' Work.

The hedges in England are still being cut; the little ordered fields that stretch from coast to coast in this favoured land are so far unknown to strife, and in a spirit of devout thankfulness we are able to report that the work of the Royal Hospital for Incurables has been carried on successfully for another year. So far the beneficent work in the cause of the helpless and incurable invalid has not been vitally hampered, but anxieties and difficulties have arisen.

Absent Helpers. Not only have our funds diminished alarmingly, our helpers in large numbers have been called from their posts at Putney. Sisters and nurses, male attendants and porters, have answered the summons from King and Country . . . Some members of the Board and the Assistant Matron have served in France . . . Our President has been actively engaged in military work. Yet, despite thinned ranks, our nine hundred and more beneficiaries have been well cared for.

Number of Beds occupied. Out of 250 available beds 221 were, on the average, occupied throughout the year. Fifteen beds are always kept empty for emergency use in the event of an epidemic, or for use when spring cleaning and other trials occur. It is not possible to 'shut down' any beds, as is the custom at a general hospital when any necessity arises. The average number of Pensioners throughout the year was 711. Full

particulars as to the cost of various items will be found in the balance-sheet at the end of this Report.

Finance

Below are some figures in reference to the Hospital's income this year, as compared with that of last year. It will be seen that subscriptions, donations, and legacies are all "down." Notwithstanding this, and as we have a waiting list of 182 accepted candidates, the Board have decided that twenty-five candidates shall be elected in November. In May last twenty-five were also elected. Unless there is an early improvement in the financial receipts, curtailment in the future numbers of beneficiaries may be necessary, but with the limited knowledge now at our disposal, conjecture on this subject is unprofitable. At the present time (October 15th) we owe to our bankers the sum of £5,000.

A £2,000

The Commercial Union Assurance Company (Limited) acting as trustees and executors of the will of the late Sir William Dunn, have made a grant of £2,000 to this Hospital, and one of the wards in the Restell Wing has been named "THE SIR WILLIAM DUNN WARD."

The War and Subscriptions.

While a section of the benevolent public have unfortunately felt it necessary to discontinue their subscriptions during the past year of financial dislocation, another section, with commendable pluck and generosity, have thought it desirable to increase, or even double, their usual contributions.

Welcome Gifts of Food. The Agent-General for Queensland—Major Sir Thomas B. Robinson—has despatched to the Royal Hospital for Incurables several most acceptable consignments of meat and tinned goods. This valuable help has enabled the Board to keep down the year's cost per head for provisions. Mr. R. J. Lesslie, who has on many occasions proved his deep interest in this National Charity, must be warmly thanked for bringing its claims before the Agent-General.

High Prices

Like the private householder, the Hospital has had to pay largely increased prices for food and all ordinary commodities. Contracts have been made for shorter periods than usual, and every effort has been made to economise and to buy in the cheapest markets. The Board have had the hearty co-operation of the Matron and Steward and other officers. It must always be remembered that a hospital sheltering hundreds of feeble and incurable invalids is not in a position to effect very drastic changes in the scale and character of its diet, for reasons that are good and sufficient.

Higher Wages. The Board have been compelled to pay higher salaries to our Sisters and others of the large staff employed. The military hospital authorities having offered remuneration for skilled labour above that hitherto paid by us, it was found necessary early in the year to give a war bonus in several departments. In spite of this, it has been very difficult to obtain the right type of male-attendant to take the places of those who have left to serve in the navy and army. One of our new men servants came all the way from Jamaica, and several Belgians have been employed.

No Festival In May last Lord Wolverton, our President, made the Dinner. following appeal to the public:—

"In May of last year, when Mr. Justice Darling "presided at the Annual Dinner in aid of the Royal "Hospital for Incurables, Putney Heath, and when nobody imagined that War with Germany would be declared in the following August, I promised to preside at this year's Annual Dinner. The Dinner is usually held in the early Summer, and by means of it the sum of about £4,000 is raised annually. This year my Colleagues on the Board of Management in the most of the sum of the better to abandon the Dinner in view of present national affairs.

"I have just ascertained from the Secretary of the "Hospital that at this time last year the Hospital had "received £52.456 from the beginning of its financial year, namely October 1st. This year the Hospital has received £18,100 cnly. Need I say any more than this? We have over nine hundred beneficiaries to whom we have pledged our word.

"I shall be grateful if you will send a contribution to this National Charity. Owing to the abandon-ment of our Annual Dinner we are sure to lose still more income, unless the response to this brief appeal is very generous."

The result was £2,000, whereas the average festival dinner held during recent years has yielded more than twice that sum. Yet, in the circumstances, the Board were deeply gratified at the outcome of the President's letter.

Our Ladies'

In April last H.R.H. Princess Christian and Lady Loch made the following appeal in the newspapers:—

"At this moment, when the War is making such "large demands on the generosity of the public, many "of the older charities are feeling acutely the need of

- "help. Of these, none makes a more urgent appeal "to our sympathies than those which deal with in-"curable illness. War or no war, these most pathetic cases continue to exist. The Ladies' Association of the Royal Hospital for Incurables, Putney Heath, "helps entirely unbefriended and therefore specially "pitiable cases. The sum of £250 is at present urgently needed to secure the Election, on May
- " 28th, of several totally unbefriended cases. Will the " public help us?"

The above appeal realised £463 16s. 6d., making the contributions for the whole year received by Miss Allcroft, the Hon. Secretary of the Association, £813 15s. od., which enabled the ladies to help substantially a number of candidates to secure election. The Board is indeed grateful to the Ladies' Association for this splendid help.

The visits of the Lady Visitors have been somewhat restricted and not quite so frequent during the past year as formerly, owing to the large demands on the tim every one caused by the needs of War work, either direct or indirect. One of our kind friends who is actively engaged in Red Cross work has been obliged to suspend for a time her visits to the Hospital. None regret the inability to visit our poor Incurables more than the Lady Visitors themselves. It is a source of real pleasure and often profit to hold intercourse with many who are living above their suffering and beyond their pain and weakness, who put on "the oil of joy for mourning and the garments of praise for the spirit of heaviness," carry their cross of trial courageously and meekly, looking "not at the things seen, but the things unseen," waiting hopefully and even happily for the Master's call: "Friend, come up higher."

The arrangements for the Annual Sale of Work this year were made with many forebodings as to success, in view of the enormous number of new charitable organisations required to meet the needs of those suffering by the War. is a cause for deep thankfulness that our fears in this instance were groundless and that the Sale proved a very successful one. It was a great advantage that the Countess of Bessborough, who kindly opened it, was able to fix the date early in June. Her goodness in coming during this time of stress and anxiety was much appreciated. Lady Bessborough knew the Hospital soon after its inception and showed much personal interest in it, even remembering our two oldest patients, Miss Stanford and Miss Rose.

The proceeds of the sale amounted to £515. During the following week Mrs. Casher, the Hon. Secretary of the Sale, received orders from kind friends who had been unable to attend, amounting to over £10, including one given for many years by Her Most Gracious Majesty the Queen. This sum provided an additional gift for each Patient. The possession of a little personal property cheers and comforts our poor invalids more than can be told, and also supplies many individual wants.

The House Committee have felt of recent years much anxiety with respect to the heating arrangements, inasmuch as the boiler plant and flues were growing old and becoming gradually less efficient, and for various reasons were unsuitable for dealing with the growing work of the Hospital. Early in 1914 the Consulting Engineer was requested to report on a Central Heating Plant to be located in the Laundry Block which would combine under one roof boilers for heating the Hospital, domestic hot water, and steam for cooking and washing. The proposals were carefully considered and the scheme adopted in August, 1914. Work was begun at once and the new plant has been running with complete success since January last. The fuel consumption appears to be reduced by at least thirty per cent. and yet there are better and quicker services, while a margin of power is

provided for a Nurses' Home. The old boiler plant is to be retained as a reserve for emergencies.

With a view to increasing the productiveness of the Gardens, it was decided to consult an expert on the breaking up of a portion of the pasture and on improved methods of cropping. As a result, Mr. Walter P. Wright, Horticultural Superintendent under the Kent Education Committee and a recognised authority on Horticulture, was engaged, first to prepare a report, and subsequently to pay monthly visits. About three quarters of an acre of pasture was bastard-trenched in winter and planted with Scotch seed potatoes. Although the abnormal weather has militated against a heavy crop this year, a fair yield has been secured. Moreover, the ground has been got into excellent condition for the future. The old kitchen garden has been cropped on an intensive system and in spite of weather trouble is splendidly furnished with useful vegetables. The increase in garden produce which these measures have secured, without addition to the present staff, makes for economy and reduction of household expenditure.

It is a pleasure for the Board to be able to state that Mr. John Thatcher this year completes fifty years as a working gardener in their service. Thatcher takes a pride in his work and his years have not yet diminished his zeal and industry. The Board congratulate their faithful old servant and are glad to put on record their good wishes for his continued robust health and activity.

Invalids Help The Board have been very glad to lend the Hospital grounds for a number of garden parties for wounded soldiers -neighbours of ours pro tem at the Fulham Military Hospital. Kind friends have supplied the cost of these parties, and our Staff and Patients have vied with one another in making them a great success. We have had the valuable help of Dr. S. Henning Belfrage and

Dr. John Gay in making the necessary arrangements for our guests. What has struck the student of mankind most about these meetings between invalids and invalids has been the eagerness of our own Incurables to do their 'bit' in making happier those who have fought and suffered in the cause of King and Country. It has been a beautiful, if pathetic, object lesson to many of us.

A Day will

Year after year has come round and found us enjoying the blessings of peace and prosperity. Now we are all only too conscious of war and the need for stern economy, but in years to come history will tell how the helpless Incurables were looked after during the national anxieties of these days. The present Board will not be here to discuss the subject, or to heed any words of appreciation for humane work done. Perhaps only a few lines on a page of some dusty volume will record that over nine hundred suffering and chronic invalids were provided for by this Institution. The Subscribers of those distant days will wonder perhaps at the courage and generosity of the benevolent folk of these days. Let us keep our trust. We never needed or deserved help so much as now.

In conclusion, the Board have no desire to beat the big drum without just cause, but with all earnestness and with all sincerity subscribers and friends are asked to do their utmost to carry on the work of the Hospital. The Board are very grateful to all those who have during the past year helped to further the interests and increase the financial receipts of the Institution; if the work is to go on there must be no diminution of effort and energy, rather must recent events spur us on to stronger resolves and greater activities.

EXTRACT FROM THE CONSTITUTION.

"The design of this Charity is not to interfere with the action of any existing institution, nor to relieve those cases for which provision is found elsewhere; nor does it profess to relieve temporary affliction; but so far as funds will permit, its aim is to provide relief for that which is continuous and permanent, and for which no public provision exists. It does not, therefore, deal with idjots, persons of unsound mind, with those who have been afflicted from birth, or who have received parochial relief."

There are two Elections a year, one on the last Friday in May and one on the last Friday in November. The List for the May Election closes on January 1st, and the List for the November Election closes on July 1st. The Board can only deal with one Election at a time. Friends who send applications for the May Election after the 1st of January must please understand that the papers are held over for the November Election; just as friends who send in papers for the November Election after the 1st of July must understand that the papers are held over for the Election in May.

The Matron will be glad to receive gifts of clothing of all kinds for the use of the male and female patients.

All presents of old Linen, large quantities of which are used, will be most thankfully received.

Presents of Game for the Patients are very highly valued.
